

The exactness of communication

According to a widespread view in philosophy of language, successful communication does not require the speaker and the hearer to entertain the same proposition. It is sufficient that they entertain similar or related propositions. The purpose of my talk is to discuss an argument against this view. The argument is based on the idea that successful communication supports agreement and disagreement. A substantial part of the talk will be devoted to making this idea more precise.
